She now teaches English and Journalism. Miss Cheatle is active at Saint

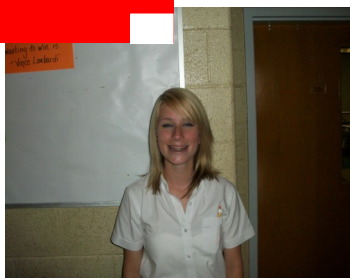

Chile Miners

On August 5 2010, most of us



were on vacation, at the beach, or just relaxing at home having a good summer vacation...unless

you were one of the 33 miners half a mile underground in the Atacama Desert. 700,000 tons of rock collapsed on the mine trapping the miners in the lower reaches of the mine. It has been 69 days since and less than half the miners have been rescued from what some people thought was certain death. To get the miners out, a vehicle had to be made to fit into a hole the size of a bicycle tire. Clinton Cragg, a NASA engineer, designed the vehicle known as the Phoenix. On this past Wednesday the 13th, the miners were rescued one by one on a 15 minute journey through 2,000 feet of rock. The last miner out,

Luis Alberto Urzua, 54, is credited with helping the miners survive the first 17 days before Chileans found out there was still some survivors. The president (of Chile) told him: "You are not the same, and the country is not the same after this. You were an inspiration. Go hug your wife and your daughter." With Urzua by his side, he led the crowd

in singing the national anthem. Although the miners are out of the mine the 69 days of dark, hot and humid conditions with little food and no health care will soon catch up to them. Many of the miners suffered skin lesions, heart problems, and a worsening of their blood pressure as

their bodies struggled to deal with temperatures as high as 100 degrees. The heat did not phase everyone however, as one of the miners, Edison

Pena, ran 3 miles a day through the mine tunnels. As for long-term problems, they will most likely going to be pulmonary. Asthma triggered by poor air quality or even cigarettes is going to be prevalent in most of the miners. Partially collapsed lungs and a depressed immune system could lead to respiratory infection. The toughest problem the miners may undergo is PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder) from the ordeal because it doesn't have a guaranteed treatment. The Chilean government has offered six months of free psychological counseling for all the men
